a) State of the Art Forensics: I have been a part of the forensic application of DNA in the courtroom, including trying the first DNA case in King County history, *State v. Cannon*, 130 Wn.2d 313, and co-authoring the appeal of *State v. Jones*, 130 Wn.2d 302. I have lectured and consulted on the subject on several occasions, including speaking at the Fred Hutchinson Cancer research Center, the Seattle Forensic Institute, and as a participant at the Cold Spring Harbor "A Decade of PCR." I also obtained membership in The American Society of Human Genetics. Appx. A.

b) Homicide Trials: The Most Dangerous Offender Project recast the role of prosecutor involvement in homicide investigations. This more lateral effort has assisted the effected families, the witnesses, the innocent, the police, and the State's case at trial. I personally tried approximately 30 murder trials and declined charges on 10 cases.

c) Jury Selection Education. "The attainment of the trial by jury...should be the creed of our political faith." Thomas Jefferson (1801). I have lectured frequently on the dynamics of Voir Dire and specifically educated colleagues on anti-discrimination jury selection. Judge Richard Jones adopted the outline (co-authored with Lisa Marchese) re *U.S v. Batson/State v. Burch* at the 1998 Washington Judicial College. I was a participant in "Voir Dire," at the Seattle Repertory Theatre. I participated in special venire panels (*State v. Cross*, 99-1-02212-9/156 Wn.2d 580; *State v. Matthews*, 02-1-05376-5/132 Wn.App. 936; *State v. Nash*, 88-1-05900-1/USDC CV-97-00022) and have personally questioned approximately 2000 potential jurors.

d) Arson prosecutions. I have tried (w/co-counsel) multiple arson cases including the tri-county coordinated prosecution of Paul Keller, the most prolific serial arsonist in U.S. history, and Martin Pang for the deaths of Seattle Fire Fighters Kilgore, Shoemaker, Terlicker and Brown.

e) Cold Case Team. An original member of the Seattle Cold Case Team, we investigated previously unsolved murders and forgotten victims--Mia Zapata, Virginia Taylor, Kristin Sumstad, Betty Minnis, and Sandra Bowman who was murdered by the first known serial killer in Washington State (Canaday). We successfully prosecuted these cases in King County Superior Court.

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15. Please summarize up to eight of the most significant matters that you participated in as an advocate. - a) Declines. After the investigation of a death/possible crime scene, consultation with police, witnesses, crime lab, autopsy view, and contact with victim family members, I have, on several occasions, declined murder charges. These were quasi-judicial decisions made to best of my ability.
- b) State v. J. Canaday, 04-1-06230-2 SEA. Cold Case First Degree Murder prosecution of the State's first known serial killer. A measure of justice and vindication was obtained for the 16 year-old, pregnant victim's husband who was himself a suspect all these years. He died a month after sentencing. Judge Richard Jones presided. 2004.
- c) State v. Ronald Matthews, 02-1-05376-5/132 Wn.App. 936. Aggravated Murder prosecution of Mr. Matthews for shooting Police Officer Richard Herzog with Herzog's own gun. Complex psychiatric testimony and evidence of premeditation. The case was heart-wrenching since the victim approached Mr. Matthews peacefully. At the same time, the decision to resist significant pressure and to not seek the death penalty was just. Judge Michael Hayden presided (206-296-9230). 2004.
- d) State v. Dayva Cross, 99-1-02212-9/156 Wn.2d 580. Aggravated murder capital prosecution of Mr. Cross who stabbed his wife and her daughters to death. Three special jury panels were required to assure that there were no untoward outside influences on the jurors. Judge Joan Dubuque presided (206-296-9255). 2001.
- e) State v. Darrell Cloud, 94-1-099828-6/95 Wn.App. 606. Challenging jury trial involving the shooting death of Mr. Cloud's former teacher and child molester. The case stands for the rule of law and for a justice system tempered with mercy. One cannot condone vigilante "justice" but also could not ignore the defendant's victimization. After years of appeals and remand, the end result mirrored the original plea offer. Judge George Mattson presided (206-296-9215). 1995.
- f) State v. K. Leuluaialii, 96-C-08256-9/118 Wn.App.780. Aggravated Murder and Animal Cruelty prosecution of co-defendants for the slayings of an innocent couple, and their dog, in Seattle's South Park neighborhood. Complex legal issues, co-defendant gang witnesses, and circumstantial evidence. Defendants sought to intimidate the witnesses, victims' families, the prosecutors, and the judge. Moreover, the only eyewitness was a young boy who ended up trusting us, testified courageously, and is safe to this day. Judge Richard Jones presided (206-296-9260). 1998.
- g) State v. Paul Keller, 93-1-00223-2. Prosecuted Mr. Keller for 26 (13/13) King County arsons and separately for the murder of three women killed in their retirement home. These crimes were both qualitatively and quantitatively remarkable. Mr. Keller caused over 25 million in damages and untold emotional pain to hundreds of victims and, disturbingly, often targeted the elderly and the vulnerable. At the same time, one felt for his family and his own father who turned him in to authorities. Judge Kathryn Trumbull (SnoCo), and Judge Jim Bates Presided. 1994.
- h) State v. T. Dillon, 90-1-06117-1. Felony prosecution of SPD Police Officer. Mr. Dillon assaulted his former wife. This stands for the proposition that no one is above the law, especially someone who ought to know better. Jury convicted Mr. Dillon on two counts. Judge Mary Brucker (ret.) presided. 1991.

1. State v. Trenino Rollins, #05-1-00171-9. Cold Case prosecution of Mr. Rollins for the strangulation of Betty Minnis, mother of a small child. Demeka, the toddler, witnessed her mother's murder and, upon trusting the system, testified fifteen years later. Challenging eyewitness testimony and "blind DNA" case. Significantly, another--innocent--man was originally accused of this murder and this prosecution provided him a measure of vindication. Judge Richard Jones presided (206-296-9260); Defense attorney John Hicks (206-838-7375).
2. State v. Victor Cannon, #90-1-07283-1; 130 Wn.2d 313. Serial rape case turning on unprecedented forensic evidence. Judge Mary Brucker (ret.) presided; Defense attorney C. Wesley Richards, 206-447-3900.
3. State v. R. Saintcalle, # 01-02-1-05941-1/53560-9 I. Domestic Violence Aggravated Murder jury trial. Especially brutal case wherein a Boeing executive murdered his wife and shot his daughter, Elizabeth, 12. Judge Richard McDermott presided (206-296-9115). Defense attorney Donald Minor, (206-621-7829).
4. State v. E. Connell, 90-1-05070-6. Assault trial involving the felonious biting of an infant. Unique question of law regarding application of deadly weapon statute, prong. Judge Bobbe Bridge presided (360-357-2050); Leo Hamaji defended (206-447-3900).
5. State v. Scott Gordon, 98-1-07852-5. Murder First degree jury trial that presented challenging premeditation issues. Judge Deborah Fleck presided, (206-296-9273); Anthony (Tony) Savage for the defense, (206-682-1882).
